Caltrans TMC Tour

On February 7, ASCE MLAB hosted a tour of Caltrans' Traffic Management Center (TMC).

The TMC is located in Glendale, CA.

The TMC serves as the operations focal point for maximizing traffic flow and reducing congestion and is the hub for emergency response efforts and freeway incidents management on the Los Angeles County and Ventura County freeway system.

The tour was led by Caltrans TMC team Dr. Morteza Fahrtash, PE and Mr. David Lau, PE and our K-12 outreach committee co-chair Leila Khalkhali, PE. Approximately 20 people attended this technical tour.

The California Department of transportation (Caltrans) District 7 and the California highway Patrol (CHP) Southern Division have combined their expertise to operate the LARTMC as working example of inter-



departmental cooperation. The LARTMC is not just about moving cars. Caltrans mission is to improve the mobility of people, goods, services, and information across the California, as the CHP works to provide safety, service and security on state freeways and highways. Working together, Caltrans and the CHP manage and monitor 42 freeways and highways totaling 1,188 freeway miles. An average on one hundred million vehicle miles are travelled daily on this system; this is equivalent of over 4,000 trips around the globe.

Across the country, transportation agencies are applying advance communications technologies known as Intelligent Transportation Systems (ITS) to improve transportation safety, mobility, efficiency and dependability. In 2007, Caltrans, as collaborating LARTMC partner, was a recipient of the "Best of ITS Award" by ITS America, a world-wide ITS program that honors the most innovative, effective and influential achievements in the ITS industry.



ASCE Constitutional Changes on the May 2020 Ballot



During the month of May 2020, the annual ASCE Society elections will be held. Included on the ballot is an initiative for approval from the membership for significant changes to the ASCE Constitution. It is important that you read and understand this ballot initiative thoroughly as it prescribes major changes

to the way the Society operates.

In April you would have received election emails from an ASCE vendor, Survey and Ballot Systems (SBS). Please be sure to add noreply@directvote.net to your approved sender list, and vote for whom you want to lead the Society and the Constitutional initiatives on the ballot. You will be able to vote directly from the email, and you will not need a special password. If you don't receive your election email by May 1, please contact support@directvote.net.

As per the January 30, 2020 ASCE News article, the Society Board previously discussed, edited and voted to approve a second reading Los Angeles Section *Monthly:* MAY 2020

of a series of ASCE Constitutional amendments at its quarterly meeting, January 9th in Detroit. The Constitutional changes, first proposed by the Governing Documents Committee last fall, include:

- Giving Affiliate members the right to vote in ASCE elections (and effectively enabling Affiliate members the right to run for as ASCE President as well)
- Loosening (shortening) the deadline for proposed amendments to the Society's governing documents
- Moving articles that do not require approval by the members to the bylaws (thereby enabling the Society board to become more nimble and efficient)

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Notice of Region 9 Opening for At-Large Governor



ASCE Region 9 invites nominations for one Region 9 Governor At-Large position for a three-year term beginning October 1, 2020. To be considered for this position, you must be a Society member in good standing and have an Address of Record within the Region being represented. It is encouraged that nominees also have prior service as a Branch,

Section or Technical Group officer, member of a Section or Branch committee, or a member of a Society-level Committee and have demonstrated leadership skills. This is an appointed position.

Under the current Region 9 Bylaws, the Region 9 Board of Governors shall base its selection on the specific qualities and/or membership affiliations that are underrepresented on the Region 9 Board of Governors by the Elected Region 9 Governors. In addition, in July 2019, the Society Board of Direction directed that all Board and Society Committees, and their constituent committees, to modify their organizational structures to require at least one (1) position be held by a Younger Member. The Region 9 Board therefore considers it desirable that a Younger Member would assume a position on its Board for the 2020-2023 term, since there is currently no Younger Member on the Board.

A Letter of Intent to apply for this elected office must be submitted not later than June 1, 2020, to the Region 9 Nominating Committee Chair: Yaz Emrani, at YEmrani@GlendaleCA.gov, (949) 285-8483. Please contact Yaz Emrani for any questions. In addition, the following documents are also requested:

- Signed Governor Commitment document (contact Yaz Emrani for form)
- Biographical Statement, not to exceed 200 words
- Vision Statement, not to exceed 200 words
- Any endorsements
- Head shot color photograph

Nominees will be requested to attend a video-conferencing interview before the Region 9 Board of Governors tentatively scheduled for June 19, 2020 at 1pm Pacific Daylight Time. A selection of At-Large Region Governor will be made that day, and all applicants will be subsequently notified.

ASCE SOCIETY BYLAWS Article 5 Management

5.4.2 Geographic Region Boards of Governors. Geographic Region Boards of Governors shall be established for each Geographic Region.

5.4.2.2 Duties. The Geographic Region Boards of Governors shall be responsible for establishing, reforming, or dissolving Geographic Units within their Region; assisting in development and implementation of the Society's Strategic Plan; reviewing Annual Reports from their respective Organizational Entities and coordinating with the Member Communities

Committee on how to resolve issues of concern; providing leadership and direction for Region technical, professional and educational activities; serving as a resource to Sections for Society level programs; providing input to the Board of Direction on policy initiatives; facilitating the process for election of Geographic Region Directors and Geographic Region Governors;

participating in the nomination process for President-elect; and fostering communications to and from the Board of Direction and between the Region's Organizational Entities.

ASCE Board of Governors Commitment

If elected to the American Society of Civil Engineers, Region 9 Board of Governors, I commit to actively participate in the growth and development of the Region 9 Board and will satisfy the following duties and requirements:

- 1. Remain in good standing as a member of the American Society of Civil Engineers
- 2. Insure that the Board of Governors operates with legal and ethical integrity and is accountable to its Members and obligations to the ASCE Society at all times;
- 3. Be accessible and contribute knowledge, experience, contacts, and resources to help assure success of Region 9
- 4. Provide input to ASCE Board of Direction, facilitate communications, help implement the Society's Strategic Plan, promote leadership development, support the local geographic units, and improve member service within the Society

- 7. Serve on ASCE Society or Region 9 Board Committees as appointed
- 8. Help secure funding for the Region 9 programs through sponsorship, corporate and charitable sources, grant funding, fundraising events, and personal donations
- 9. Help encourage, support and recruit new Society Committees, Governors, Directors, President-Elect Nominees
- 10. Attend all monthly Region 9 Board meetings (typically monthly conference calls and three face-to-face meetings per year held throughout the State)
- 11. Attend and participate in annual Multi-Region 8 & 9 Leadership Conference as a facilitator and session moderator
- 12. Attend Leader Orientation as a new governor held by ASCE Society in Reston, Virginia
- 13. Attend annual ASCE Presidents and Governors Forum held by ASCE Society in Reston, Virginia (recommended)
- 14. Attend annual Region 9 Infrastructure Symposium and Region 9 Awards Dinner
- 15. Attend annual ASCE Society Convention and provide updates to the Board of Governors on information received (recommended)
- 16. Attend as many local ASCE Section, Branch, YMF, LMF, Student Chapter, local Institute Chapters and technical and professional group events as possible in support of ASCE Region 9 Board goals and objectives
- 17. Section/Elected Governors Attend Section Board meetings of your assigned Section and participate as voting members of the Section Board.

State Investments and Legislative Update

The world was stood on its' head in March by the COVID-19 crisis. As the health and economic crisis expanded in California, the Legislature passed an emergency spending package of two bills (SB 89 and SB 117) for Governor Newsom. It recessed early for its' spring recess that has now been extended to May 4, 2020.

Executive Orders
Governor Newsom was very busy in
March – issuing a series of executive

orders to deal with the crisis.

N-25-20 March 12 Directs Californians to follow public health directives including canceling large gatherings more than 250 people. Order removes waiting period for unemployment and disability insurance for Californians who lose work as a result of the COVID-19 outbreak. Readies state to commandeer hotels & medical facilities to isolate & treat COVID-19 patients. Allows local and state legislative bodies to hold meetings via conference calls while still meeting state transparency requirements

N-26-20 March 13 Order mandates that school districts use dollars to fund distance learning and high-quality educational opportunities, safely provide school meals, and arrange for the supervision of students during school hours. Order requires Department of Education and California Health & Human Services Agency to develop strategies to address equity challenges around internet connectivity, ensure students with disabilities receive specialized education, and safely provide meals. Order urges employers to take area school closures into account and provide flexibility during the COVID-19 crisis

N-27-20 March 16 Updated California Health Guidance: Seniors and COVID-19 vulnerable residents directed to home isolate. Health care, residential and non-residential facilities licensed by the state, especially those serving senior citizens and other COVID-19 vulnerable populations, will face significant challenges

N-28-20 March 16 The Executive Order authorizes local governments to halt evictions, slows foreclosures, and protects against utility shut offs

N-29-20 March 18 The order waives eligibility re-determinations for 90 days for Californians who participate in:

- Medi-Cal health coverage
- CalFresh food assistance
- CalWORKS
- Cash Assistance for Immigrants; and
- In-Home Supportive Services

The change will allow current recipients of these safety net programs to continue receiving them without interruption. The executive order also waives certain provisions of the Bagley-Keene Act.

N-30-20March18waive, pending federal approval, this year's statewide testing for California's more than 6 million students in K-12 schools.

N-32-20 March 18 providing flexibility to local governments to spend their emergency homelessness funding on immediate solutions tailored to combatting COVID-19 and its impacts on the homeless population. The Governor also waived certain regulatory barriers for any shelters or facilities built with this emergency funding.

N-33-20 March 19 Stay at home order

N-34-20 March 20 to permit vote-by-mail procedures to be used in three upcoming special elections, protecting public health and safety during the COVID-19 outbreak.

N-35-20 March 21 The order gives the state the ability to increase the health care capacity in clinics, mobile health care units and adult day health care facilities. It also allows local governments more flexibility to utilize the skills of retired employees and reinforces the importance of the delivery of food, medicine and emergency supplies.

N-36-20 March 24 No new commitments to state prisons or juvenile facilities will be accepted for the next 30 days Order also directs videoconferencing of all scheduled parole suitability hearings starting next month

N-37-20 March 27 authorizing local governments to halt evictions through May 31, 2020.

N-38-20 March 27 Order would enable California Chief Justice to take emergency actions for the state's courts to be able to conduct business during the COVID-19 pandemic.

N-39-20 March 30 expand health care workforce and staff at least an additional 50,000 hospital beds needed for the COVID-19 surge.

N-40-20 March 30 Order provides 90-day extension in state and local taxes, including sales tax. Order extends licensing deadlines and requirements for a number of industries

N-41-20 April 1 Funds will be deployed for hospital surge efforts, as well as other needs related to the COVID-19 response

N-42-20 April 2 Order protects consumers who may be unable to pay for water service during COVID-19 crisis

N-43-20 April 3 allows health care providers to use video chats and applications to provide health services without risk of penalty. Order aligns with federal Health and Human Services guidelines and waivers issued in response to COVID-19

N-44-20 April 3 limit price increases from sellers on critical items, such as food and medical supplies

N-45-20 April 4 guidance on prioritizing enrollment of children of essential critical infrastructure workers. Order will suspend restrictions on access to state-subsidized childcare programs. Order also allows California to take advantage of new federal flexibility to provide pandemic SNAP benefits to children to reduce food insecurity

New Reports of Interest

Water Blueprint for the San Joaquin Valley, "coalition of local governments, academic institutions, water users and others," released a report titled "Blueprint Economic Impact Analysis: Phase One Results" by UC Berkeley economists David Sunding and David Roland-Holst, findings include "unless responsible, balanced water reforms are enacted in the effort to achieve groundwater sustainability goals in the San Joaquin Valley," California "stands to permanently lose as many as 85,000 full-time jobs and \$2.1 billion in employee wages."

Legislative Analyst's Office released "Review of the Draft 2020 High Speed Rail Business Plan," it provides an overview of High-Speed Rail Project that was approved by voters in 2008 through Prop. 1A which authorized \$10 billion in general obligation bonds to be sold for building a high-speed rail system between Sacramento, San Francisco and Los Angeles; reports that HSR 2020 plan estimates cost of building a system between San Francisco and Los Angeles now to be \$80.3 billion and that the first segment scheduled for operation will be between Merced and Bakersfield in 2029; among the "key issues" the report identifies for the Legislature's consideration is that "the near- and long-term schedules identified in the draft 2020 business plan appear ambitious" and an "important decision point" for the Legislature to consider is that the High Speed Rail Authority "is poised to make key decisions," such as its intention "to award a track and systems contract in Sept. 2020" for the entire San Francisco to

Bakersfield line, which "will reduce flexibility to change the project if in the future legislative priorities change."

The Legislative Analyst's Office released "COVID-19 and California's Evolving Fiscal Outlook," a brief analysis on how COVID-19 is impacting the financial markets, likely increasing the chances of a recession and lowering tax revenues from capital gains income by "several billion dollars lower than what the Governor's budget assumed," but points to California "adding significantly to the state's budget reserves" in recent years as a "key advantage" and is "better prepared to weather the public health crisis and unfolding economic downturn."

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
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Following the Keynote Speaker, Jong-Wha Bai, Ph.D., PE, gave an update on the California Baptist University Capital Improvement Project.

ASCE Region 9 Grand Challenge Task Committee Update

As I write this article, I am experiencing perhaps the most challenging time in my professional career. The Novel Coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic has literally changed the world as we knew it. The health emergency has become a global economic crisis. For me, ASCE's Grand Challenge has taken on a completely new and broader meaning. Reducing lifecycle costs and fostering the optimization of infrastructure investments for society are worthy goals

and innovation is now needed more than ever to address social emergencies never before experienced. As the Emergency Manager for Los Angeles County Public Works, I am immersed in the response for COVID-19 and it has provided me the opportunity for innovative thinking and problem solving in real time.

For the first time in history, our Department Operations Center has been activated at Level 1, the highest level, in support of our Los Angeles County Emergency Operations Center (CEOC) and the Los Angeles County Public Health Officer. Under this structure, our civil engineers are leading the way in identifying facilities that will serve as quarantine sites to house individuals suffering or suspected of suffering from coronavirus. The goal is to identify 2000 beds to handle the anticipated surge, and in a matter of two weeks, we have procured, inspected and converted several hotels, motels, and RV Parks that have fulfilled 50 percent of our goal. More facilities are currently under consideration. Engineers are busy converting the Los Angeles Convention Center into a field hospital to treat a potential surge in COVID-19 patients. These fast-tracked processes have succeeded due to innovative procedures, emergency guidelines, and collaborative efforts between public and private entities.

In addition, in order to combat the spread of COVID-19, Public Works is implementing the orders of the County Health Officer and we have transitioned 50 percent of our workforce to a telework model. As a government agency, we had resisted this model in the past but given the social distancing guidelines, we quickly adjusted. Managers quickly developed productivity guidelines, equipped staff with the required technological tools, and are now continuing the delivery of essential services from remote locations.

Yet with all this disruption, we continue to deliver essential infrastructure and municipal services, while maintaining business continuity in all sectors to support our local economy. All plan checking and permitting is now done online using an Electronic Permitting & Inspection system. We continue to perform on-site inspection services while practicing social distancing, and offer virtual inspection services. Per the Safer at Home Order, construction is considered an essential service so we will continue to support all private and public construction operations. In addition, all construction bidding is

now performed electronically. Water agencies continue to serve safe, clean potable water to millions of customers. So, there's no need for members of the public to hoard drinking water; they can trust their water from their tap.

We have also adjusted many of our field operations, which must continue for the safety of the communities we serve. Smaller crews, increased personal protective equipment, face coverings, and COVID-19 safety tailgates are just some of today's new normal in infrastructure operations and maintenance.

We will get through this together and we will adjust to the next challenge because by nature, we are problem solvers. There is no room for "we have always done it this way" mentality. The economic downturn spurred by COVID-19 presents an opportunity for infrastructure delivery in new and innovative ways. Background on Assembly Member Rivas

Luz M. Rivas was born in Los Angeles to an immigrant family and grew up in the Northeast San Fernando Valley. She attended LA Unified schools before earning a Bachelor's degree in Electrical Engineering from MIT and a Master's of Education from Harvard.

Luz has built her career at the intersection of engineering, education and public service. She worked as an electrical design engineer at Motorola before founding DIY Girls, a nonprofit that provides enrichment programs focused on encouraging young girls to pursue careers in science, engineering and technology. While presiding over DIY Girls, she served as a Champions Board Member of the California Girls in STEM Collaborative; as a Senior Fellow at the USC Marshall Brittingham Social Enterprise Lab; on the Visiting Committee for the MIT Dean of Undergraduate Studies; and as a service learning instructor for engineering undergraduates at USC. She also collaborated with engineers, planners and environmentalists to develop environmental technology curricula for high school students and worked to increase diversity at Caltech and on NASAand NSF-funded projects that aimed to increase access to STEM in community-based organizations. In 2016, she was appointed by Mayor Eric Garcetti to the Los Angeles Board of Public Works.

Luz was elected and sworn into the California State Assembly in June of 2018. She currently serves on the Assembly Committees on Budget; Budget Subcommittee No. 3 on Resources and Transportation; Jobs, Economy Development, and the Economy; Labor and Employment; Local Government; Revenue and Taxation; and is co-chair of the Legislative Ethics Committee. It is an honor for her to represent the community she grew up in.
